ABOUT THE CENTRE

The Centre for the Study of Comparative Religions and Civilizations (CSCRC) was launched in 2005. One of the few of its kind to be established at an Indian University, the Centre takes a serious look at the neglected field of Religious Studies in India. The newly emergent discipline of Religious Studies does not form part of any academic curricula and, has therefore, not found a sound footing in the Indian academia. One of the concerns of the Centre is to redress this imbalance and to create a site for an academic study of Comparative Religions that forms a part of mainstream liberal art education curricula in India. The Centre is committed to develop a cross-cultural, interdisciplinary programme of research and curriculum development

Objectives of the Centre

- To carry out a critical comparative study of religion characterized by methodological pluralism.
- To apply historical, archaeological, linguistics, textual, sociological, anthropological, psychological, phenomenological, ethnographic and art historical methods in the study of religion.
- To change the discourse of Religious Studies from a reductive to a more holistic frame that is in consonance with Indic ethos, social reality and concerns of emergent global society.
- To conduct academic programmes that highlight the positive role of religion in sustaining India's composite culture rooted in peace and harmony.
- To identify and document common humanitarian values propagated by various religions.
- To develop study material and courses on various religious doctrines and philosophies.
- To develop institutional links with universities and research institutes and with appropriate agencies of the United Nations.
- To publish research studies on the above lines in the form of books and monographs.

DEGREES OFFERED

The Centre offers semester based Research Degrees, viz., M. Phil & Ph.D. programmes in Comparative Religion.

M. Phil & Ph. D. Programmes in Comparative Religion

The M. Phil. Programme spreads over four semesters including course work and dissertation writing. In the first two semesters of the programme, research scholars are offered five taught courses, including a tool course in a classical language corresponding to their area of research, and specialized courses in religion.

WHY STUDY RELIGION AT CSCRC?

A degree in Comparative Religion at the Centre will *not* train students to become religious specialists this is not a theology course. It will instead train them in critical thinking and equip them with skills to understand a phenomenon as pervasive as religion from a multitude of perspectives. Despite unceasing prophecies about the end of religion, we find it everywhere we turn, even in the most modern institutions and practices—from politics to popular culture. Religious Studies is an emerging terrain in Indian academia. While religion may be a theme of study in other departments, most importantly in departments of Sociology and History, or Islamic Studies, the wide array of theoretical and methodological tools culled from across disciplines makes learning experience at this Centre unique. The sheer breadth and span of the programmes offered expose students to a variety of cultural experiences and traditions, turning them into cultural interlocutors. Designed to address a range of issues, from visual arts, gender, ecology, the course will enable students to seek careers in a variety of fields: in museums and archives, journalism, NGOs, or in academics.





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
